Our 70th Anniversary Showcase is June 15th at the Johnson County Arts and Heritage Center, Janet and the committee have worked hard to make this event a success. You will find more details in our newsletter. Thank you for all that have volunteered their time to help with this event. The day before, on June 14th, KCUR will run spots about our event and broadcast Janet's interview. The PBS station in Warrensburg is also giving us some exposure. KC Studio magazine is writing an article about our anniversary too.

We just received notice that there is a demonstration opportunity at Deanna Rose on June 26th; details are in our newsletter. Next, many of us will be preparing for Convergence in Wichita. Remember, there will NOT be a meeting in July since many of our members will be absent.

During the month of July, we will need to start collecting handmade towels from members who would like to have theirs displayed for this show. Guild History:

The Weavers Guild of Greater Kansas City was established in 1954 with the goal of promoting the art of weaving. As the Guild has evolved, our mission has grown to include furthering the art and interest in hand weaving and related fiber arts for members and the public.

The official formation of the Weavers Guild was the culmination of six monthly meetings beginning in the fall of 1953. The initial meeting brought together several people interested in weaving who were able to recruit additional individuals to monthly planning meetings. The participants ranged from novice to expert weavers and contained what historical notes describe as 'a nucleus of pioneering spirits willing to work for the establishment of a permanent weaving organization'.

By the end of 1954, the Guild had 41 charter members. Membership has grown in the intervening years, and by 2023 the Guild had 90 members.

The Guild has a long standing tradition of furthering the education of our members with speakers and other programming. In January of 1954, the Guild hosted our first guest speaker, Lysbeth Wallace, who spoke about teaching weaving in the Philippine Islands.

The Guild's first act of sponsorship took place in June of 1954, when the Weavers Guild donated \$25 as a prize for the Handwoven Textiles portion of the Kansas Designer and Craftsman Show. The Guild's most recent sponsorship activity is supporting a Textiles & Tea presentation of the Handweavers Guild of America.

In 1975, the Fiber Guild formally established themselves as a night time meeting group separating from the Weavers Guild with the election of their own board members.

Membership in either guild entitles the member to monthly newsletters, participation in both guilds' activities, and access to both libraries.

Voting rights, however, are limited to the guild in which one has membership.

In 1984 the Guild received tax-exempt status as a 501(C)(3) charitable organization. The charity

that the Guild currently supports is Project Linus. Blankets made by Guild members are donated to Project Linus which are then distributed to children in need.

Upcoming Programs:
